Hamilton Job Report

Executive Summary

WPH's monthly snapshots offer an insight into the **latest labour** market trends for each month. The reports highlight economic trends and employment statistics for Ontario and the Hamilton region. Indicators are sourced from Statistic Canada's most up-to-date Labour Force Survey data each month. Pages 3-4 use data on seasonally adjusted three-month moving averages, as such, fluctuations in numbers snapshot-by-snapshot may occur.

What's Covered in May's Report

This report focuses on 5 main topics: 1) inflation updates in Canada; 2) changes in employment within Ontario and Hamilton; 3) Hamilton youth statistics; 4) industry-specific changes; and 5) in-demand jobs in the Hamilton region.

Main Highlights

- Total CPI in Canada increased in April 2023 to 4.4%.
- The unemployment rate in May 2023 for Hamilton was 5%.
- Hamilton's youth labour force continues to grow in May.
- Ontario's top growing industry was Manufacturing and the top declining industry was Transportation and Warehousing.
- McMaster University was Hamilton's top hiring employer in May.
- Retail Salespersons continue to be in high-demand for Hamilton.



Tracking Inflation

Inflation in Canada, April 2023

In April 2023, Canada saw a slight hike in the Total CPI inflation, **increasing to 4.4%** (CPI-Trim: 4.2%; CPI-Median: 4.2%; CPI-Common: 5.7%). In June, the Bank of Canada increased its policy interest rate by 0.25% to 4.75% from 4.5% amidst strong goods and services demand and a tight job market.

Ontario's unemployment rose to 5.5% (+0.6%) in May 2023; the employment rate was 61.9% (-0.4) and the participation rate at 65.6% (+0.1). Compared to the last three months, the participation rate has remained consistent - with a dip in the employment rate and a hike in the unemployment rate for May. Compared to last month, Ontario's labour force grew by 29,800 persons (+0.4%) (seasonally unadjusted).

For May 2023, Hamilton's unemployment totaled **5% - down by 0.4%** since April 2023. The employment rate continues to decrease **at 60.4%** (-0.1%) and the participation rate was **63.6%** (-0.5%). Compared to last month, Hamilton's labour force saw a continuous **decline of 2,600** in May 2023 (seasonally unadjusted).

Figure 4. Youth Labour Force (15-24 years, thousands), Mar 2023-May 2023

This data looks at those 15-24 years old. Youth that either have a job or business are known as **employed youth**. Youth that are without work, available for work, or actively seeking work are known as **unemployed youth**. Together, employed and unemployed youth constitute the **youth labour force (LF)**.



For the Hamilton CMA, the youth population and labour force **continue to increase** in May 2023. The youth population settled at 101,100 and the youth labour force at 64,900. Male youth made up **52%** of May's labour force and female youth made up **48%** of the total youth labour force.

In May 2023, the youth unemployment rate totaled 12.5% (+0.3%); the youth employment rate was 56.1% (+2.3%); and the youth participation rate was 64.2% (+3%). The population of employed youths grew by 3,200 and unemployed youths increased by 700. Full-time employment among youth in Hamilton increased by 2,900 youths to 27,200 in May. Part-time employment, on the other hand, increased by 300 youths to 29,500.

Ontario's top growing industry for May 2023 was **Manufacturing**, with a monthly increase of 20,100 (+2.5%) workers.

Following was Accommodation and Food Services with a growth of 19,200 (4.7%)

Other top growing industries were Information, Culture, Recreation (3.5%), Other Services (2.2%); and Utilities (6.6%).

Ontario's top declining industry for May 2023 was **Transportation and Warehousing**, losing 18,700 (-4.6%) workers.

Following was Wholesale and Retail Trade with a loss of 13,800 workers (-1.2%).

Other industries which saw employment losses were Health Care and Social Assistance (-1.4%), Business, Building and Other Support Services (-4.2%); and Professional, Scientific and Technical Services (-1.3%).

Job Postings for May 2023

WPH'S *Job Demand Reports* capture monthly data on job postings from job boards and employer websites that recruit candidates in the Hamilton region.

In May 2023, WPH's Job Board collected **8,665** job postings from **2,622** employers throughout the month.

Compared to last month's total, the number of active job postings increased by 177 (+2%), with a 2% increase in the number of new job postings.

Top 5 Employers

The top hiring employer in May 2023 was McMaster University with 449 job postings, keeping its position after overtaking Hamilton Health Sciences last month.

Following were Hamilton Health Sciences, St. Joseph's Healthcare; the City of Hamilton; and Kijiji Employers.

The top in-demand job for May 2023 was Retail Salespersons (6421). The following were Registered Nurses and Registered Psychiatric Nurses (3012), Transport Truck Drivers (7511), Food Industry Related Occupations (6711), and Cooks (6322).

Retail Salespersons continue to dominant as the top indemand occupation for Hamilton. 3 out of 5 in-demand occupations remain in the Sales and Services occupational group.
